Latest News from Congo

There have been a great number of deaths from Covid in Lubumbashi including the Archbishop and many prominent citizens.



Archbishop Tafunga who campaigned for the value of the individual, democracy and human rights.

Vaccination is slow due to shortages, and many do not want to be vaccinated.

The headteachers sent us a summary of the annual report in September:

The children stayed on at school in July and August to make up for lost time. They broke up for one month on 8th September and started the new school year on 4th October.

Of the 616 pupils in primary (317 girls and 299 boys), 536 passed their exams but 80 have to resit the year. There was 100% pass rate in the last year of primary school, enabling the children to go on to secondary school. There were 410 pupils in the secondary school (250 girls and 160 boys), 355 of whom passed their exams. 54 pupils will have to resit the year and one has been expelled. One final year student, Isaac, who has

been sponsored through secondary school, is awaiting his results and might need supporting through further education. The library is being well used, and we have received a copy of the timetable and rules for it. The government has backtracked on its pledge to offer free education as they are not ensuring that all teachers are being paid. Sister Virginie explained the salary problems of the secondary teachers as none of them is recognised by the government. Many have jobs elsewhere to supplement their income, others should be helped by contributions from the parents many of whom do not pay. In fact the sisters were owed \$3,750 this year from parents, and their children have had their school reports confiscated in the hope of recouping the money.

The students in the main picture, wearing their celebration outfits, are the ones who left school in the summer having majored in Pedagogy. We hope some of them will eventually teach at the primary school. A Belgian charity has donated money to buy: masks for the teachers and pupils; two infrared thermometers; two large hand basins with pedals; solar panels to provide electricity in the computer room and drilling to

have water on site permanently. These items will be a great asset to the school.

The sisters had a meeting with the chief of the area about purchasing the land for new toilets on 28th September. We will know the outcome soon.

We have received messages from our four university students (See overleaf), who seem to be coping in spite of the difficulties.

Fundraising

Our efforts have been severely curtailed during the pandemic however we did manage to have a garden party in Beccles. For some, it was the first socializing since the pandemic began. Many people baked cakes and we set up a shop selling home-grown fruit and vegetables as well as bric-a-brac, books and lovely handmade items. Fabulous raffle prizes were donated, too. £910 was raised which included
